# **Community Impact**

Facilitating philanthropy is at the core of CFNL's work. Thank you to all donors, funder holders, volunteers and community organizations for your amazing work in 2021 to make our province an even better place. Thank you for inviting us into these partnerships.

In 2021 CFNL directly granted \$67,767 and supported national Community Foundation programs with granting \$415,917 in Newfoundland and Labrador.

CFNL was a partner in the Government of Canada's Investment Readiness Program and the Canada Healthy Communities Initiatives. As part of its membership in the national community foundation network, CFNL volunteers utilized their extensive community knowledge to review and recommend applications from across the province. # Fund Focus - Youden Family Fund

When you meet James Youden, the first thing you will notice is the lively, infectious, positive spirit this man brings into a room. His desire to "do some good and give a helping hand" comes as naturally to him as breathing. His parents instilled in him many attributes including the value of education, hard work and, when successful, to share while you can.

One Christmas Eve over 40 years ago, James was reflecting on a particularly profitable year and his good fortune. He was grateful and wanted to pay it forward. He took cash from his till and walked over to the Salvation Army Office to make a donation. When questioned later "What if you need that money next year?" his response has always been "We'll cross that bridge when we come to it."

This attitude of "sharing while you can" has been honed by all members of the Youden family. James and his family were among some of the first people to start a fund with CFNL. Over the years their generosity has helped people through organizations such as the Nova Central School District, Stella's Circle and the Murphy Centre. In addition to his amazing generosity through CFNL, James has also been a supporter to Memorial University, Salvation Army School Lunch Program and Summer Camps.

#### **Investment Performance**

The portfolio for the calendar year 2021 returned a net result of 9.55%. The portfolio at year end was comprised of an asset mix of 63% equities, 33% fixed income and 4% short term deposits. Since RBC took over management in 2015, the CFNL portfolio has returned 5.87% on an annual basis.

## Investment Readiness Program

- Food Producers Forum, NL (\$17,500) FPF was incorporated in March 2020 to support food production at the community level. Funds from this project will assist with the marketing of products and services to food producers and gardeners.
- Grown Twillingate Inc. (\$8,143) Creation of an on-line learning opportunities through live-streamed webinars and video content to encourage digital creativity, and provide virtual conferencing facilities to other regional entities.
- Business & Arts NL (\$14,400) Creation of a new service: trained artist facilitators offering communication, planning and motivational training. Market analysis and development will make this a viable source of revenue for BANL and participating artists.
- O'Brien Farm (\$36,000) The O'Brien Farm Foundation is currently building an Agricultural Business Incubator on their 31-acre property. This funding was used to contract an Agricultural Business Consultant
- Port Blandford Heritage Society (\$14,000) The project will enhance the Society and allow it to grow community engagement and tourism products. Specific purchases will include picnic table; cooking/warming equipment/. tents and portable toilets.
- Learning Disabilities Association St. John's (\$28,800) This money was used to hire a consultant to conduct research, feasibility study and business planning for developing a social enterprise to provide Learning Disabilities Screening and Assessment needs.
- The Workshop on Fogo Island/Shorefast Foundation (\$10,750) The Woodshop manufactures and sells furniture. The funds were used to obtain branding for a new line of contemporary mid-priced furniture.

# Canada Healthy Communities Initiative

- Business and Arts NL (\$29,556) Creating an app and online map that features works of public art across the province and encourages citizens to get outside, explore art and engage with others in the safety of outdoor spaces.
- Food Producers Forum (\$17,090) Upgrades to its website and digital platforms to improve access to healthy food, address food security by providing information to the local community, and create a hub for innovation in agriculture and food distribution at the community level.
- Newfoundland Aboriginal Women's Network (\$50,718) Developing a series of land-based experiences focused on fostering Indigenous connection to the land in 15 Indigenous communities to support mentorship and encourage relationships between Peer Facilitators of Empowering Indigenous Women for Stronger Communities, Elders and Youth.
- Gander Community Tennis Association (\$50,000) Creating an outdoor play area for families and seniors including Bocce Ball courts, Horseshoe Pits, shuffleboards, green lawn area for croquet/lawn bowling and Pickle Ball.
- John Howard Society (\$25,000) The Phoenix Garden Project at Her Majesty's Penitentiary (HMP) offers individuals in the prison an innovative arts-based curriculum that combines mindfulness and creativity with hands-on gardening and landscaping training.
- Canadian Inclusivity Squash Program, CBS, NL (\$59,214) Renovations to the CBS Recreation Complex to enable people with mobility disabilities the opportunity to play squash.
- Labrador Friendship Centre (\$34,800) Purchase a van for the Seniors Van Project, which provides
  affordable transportation services to seniors in the Happy Valley-Goose Bay area. Seniors use the
  service to attend medical appointments, shop, run errands, participate in community events, and
  visit with friends.
- Western Bay Lighthouse Trail (\$10,000) Retrofitting and renovating the boardwalk and other community spaces in the area to provide residents with spaces to be physically active.
